John married Mary Alward in November 1836. Mary was childless when she died in August 1854. John then married Adeline (Betsey) Newcomb and their daughter Mary Alward was born in 1857. By 1880, John and Adeline had "adopted" Etta Hamilton, age 8 years.

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Nunda Notables: John F. Barber - Part 1

The house pictured here, on the corner of Short Tract and Oakland Roads, is known to most local residents and to many who travel through this area. However, few realize that this was the home of John F. Barber (1809-1883), a much respected citizen and most successful farmer, businessman, and banker who overcame many obstacles, hardships, and challenges throughout his life.

Born in Montgomery County Sept. 2, 1809, John F. (for Failing, his Mother's maiden name). Barber moved with his family in 1820 to Portage, then a part of "Greater Nunda." John's father Samuel was a wheelwright who also made huge heavy "bull plows" of wood with wrought iron points and facings. Not yet a teenager, John used a bull plow while driving long ox teams "breaking up the oak openings" for Col. George Williams, Portage farmer and land agent for the 50,000 acre Cottringer tract.

By 1827 both of John's parents had died, leaving him with no home, several hundred dollars of debt, and three vounger brothers and a sister to raise and educate. At age 17 John had only his father's tools and, with the help of friends, continued his father's plow business, often working from 4 AM to after midnight in the shop, His skill and perseverance brought him credit and patronage. He succeeded in paying off his father's debts and made sure his siblings received an education. After finishing school, his younger brother Andrew became a lawyer. Unfortunately, Andrew died in 1857.

John preferred using plows to making them. In 1834 he borrowed money for the first payment on a 65.5 acre farm, adding a second farm in 1835. His property was adjacent to Col Williams' large farm, much of which he worked on shares.

John spent his winters lumbering, buying timber by the tree or acre, hauling it at least five miles to the Genesee River, and rafting it to Rochester in the spring by making use of snow melt or rain to swell the river. This difficult and dangerous raft running took about a week and John would return from Rochester on foot, walking the 50 miles on muddy roads in one day. Completion of the Genesee Valley Canal to Mt. Morris in 1840 did away with rafting. Loads of lumber were hauled on the

Building Renovations - Part 2 New Archives & Exhibit Spaces

Although the latest renovation project on the Historical Building was completed last spring, work continues on the new archives and exhibit space.

A grant sponsored by the New York State Council on the Arts and administered through the group Museumwise allowed the Society to engage the services of Walter Mayer, Director of Museum Collections at the Buffalo & Erie County Historical Society. Mr. Mayer worked with a NHS committee consisting of Margaret Barkley, Sally Hall, Alice Thompson, Sue Long, Joan Schumaker and Tom Cook. In addition to meeting at the Historical Building, several committee members spent a day at the Buffalo and Erie County Museum, getting a guided tour with Mr. Mayer that included suggestions on care of collection items, a look at the Museum's archival storage areas, and an opportunity to visit a variety of exhibits.

The committee felt the consultancy was very helpful. The Library staff has begun the move into the new archives space, and the committee will be working on a procedures manual during the coming year.

Another committee has been working for the past month on the new Nunda history exhibit. When completed in 2013, the exhibit will tell the story of the Nunda area from prehistoric to modern times.

There will be more information on both projects in the next newsletter.

roads and John loaded both ways, carrying salt way into Allegany.

John's biographer noted: "Of medium height, but of full and compact physique, his capacity for hard labor and enduring fatigue few could equal and fewer were willing to undertake." Large gangs of men were needed in hay fields or to harvest and John "had a genius for extracting labor from his men ... he was ever the leader and asked none to do his equal in his work" John became the most successful farmer in the region by "skillful cropping and reasonable seeding."

He continued to enlarge his farm in 1843 and again in 1849, when he purchased adjoining land with a large house that had been started by his brother-in-law, Nathaniel Alward. John made this house into the show place that became known as Chestnut Place.

In his personal life, John lost two wives and a baby daughter. In 1830, at age 21, John married Rhoda Tyler from Nunda. In feeble health for a long time, Rhoda died in March 1836 at age 24 and their three month old daughter died in May 1836.

This summer the Society is hosting a bus trip to Lockport, NY on Monday, July 16th, leaving



Nunda at 7:45 AM. The day will be filled with many interesting and educational experiences and a delicious lunch.

Experience a unique **2-hour Erie Canal Cruise** which includes "locking through" and being raised the 49 ft. elevation of the Niagara Escarpment (the same one that creates Niagara Falls) in the only double set of locks on the Erie Canal. You will pass under bridges that raise straight up, see water cascade over Lockport's famous "Flight of Five" 1840's locks, and travel through the solid walls of the "rock cut" as your Coast Guard licensed captain describes the architecture, sights, and folklore along the way.

The cruise will be followed by a **Buffet Lunch at the Canalside Banquet Center** and, if you choose, a visit to the **Canalside Gift Shop**. We will then visit the **Erie Canal Discovery Center**, a state-of-the-art interpretive center for the Erie Canal, and particularly the role that Lockport, NY played in the history of the Erie Canal. Featured is the 13' x 20' Raphael Beck mural, "The Opening of the Erie Canal, October 26, 1825." This beautiful floor to ceiling mural depicts the celebration surrounding then NY Governor Dewitt Clinton's ceremonial first passage through the now famous "Flight of Five" locks in Lockport to officially open the Erie Canal. We are most pleased to announce that Dewitt Clinton is going to join us as our host at the Discovery Center.

The afternoon also includes a guided tour of more beautiful **Tiffany Windows** in the **First Presbyterian Church**, across from the Discovery Center. The Center is part of the **Niagara County Historical Society Com-plex**, a total of seven buildings that present a glimpse of area life over the last 175 years. The Outwater Memorial Building, an 1863 brick home, features a Victorian Parlor, Historic Pantry, Old Toy Room, the Civil War Room, a Changing Exhibit Room and a well stocked gift shop. Other buildings include exhibits of: early firefighting equipment; tools used by early blacksmiths, coopers, carpenters, and cobblers; and Native American life, including a diorama of an Iroquois village. You will have an opportunity to visit this complex until 4:30 PM when the bus leaves for a 6:30 PM arrival in Nunda.

The cost of bus transportation, canal cruise, lunch, and tours is **\$90 per person**. Please join us for this exciting trip into Western New York history. 

Blacksmith Shop on State Street; the Nunda Schools on Mill Street, and the Genesee Valley Canal. The Cooperville Mill from just outside the village is also included.

Treasures featured from Dalton include: the Wheeler Cheese Factory, Dalton's Main Street before the "big fire," the Dalton Banking House, Wells Witherell's Blacksmith Shop and other buildings on State Street.

Some of *Nunda's Forgotten Treasures* featured in past calendars are also pictured as reminders of Nunda's past. Advertise-





Early Nunda - Bell Memorial Library is 100



Nunda's Bell Memorial Library was a gift of Katherine Bell Lewis of Buffalo, in memory of her mother, brother, and father, The Hon. Alfred Bell, an early Nunda industrialist and NYS Assemblyman for Livingston County in 1857 and 1858. The building was designed by Mrs. Lewis, Green & Wicks of Buffalo were architects, and R. E. Williams of Buffalo, the builder. Mrs. Lewis transferred the Bell Memorial Library to the Nunda Library Association on April 6, 1912 and included 300 volumes and some furnishings. She credited Capt. Hand's "unswerving devotion to gather together 2,500 volumes" that needed housing as the primary reason for her decision to spend \$20,000 on this library building. Her love of her family and her years in Nunda were also factors in her decision.
